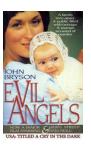

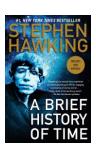


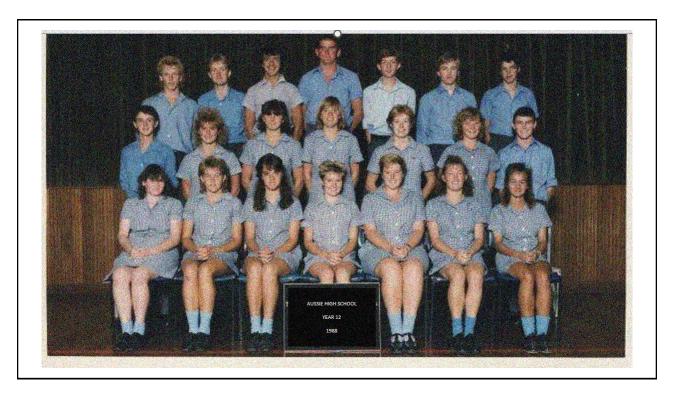


















Other Relevant History

- Normal hair distribution
- UHCG negative
- Jessica describes having lots of hot flushes and night sweats since she ceased COCP
- No other significant medical or surgical history
- One younger sister, no other siblings and no family history of intellectual disability or early menopause

Jessica's Results

- Jessica's Initial Bloods
 - FSH is 56 IU/L (normal range: 3-25 IU/L)
 - E2<18 pmol/L (normal range: 100-1700 pmol/L)
 - Prolactin normal
- A repeat FSH in 6 weeks is 62 IU/L and estradiol levels 60pmol/L

Jessica's Followup Tests

- Screening for autoimmune conditions associated with POI (Addison's /Hashimoto's/Crohn's/Celiac)-all negative
- Ovarian ultrasound to exclude autoimmune cysts, AFC, surgery, congenital causes such as androgen insensitivity syndrome- normal
- Infectious disease and metabolic screening if indicated in the history-normal
- Investigations for iatrogenic causes if indicated in history
- Bone assessment DEXA normal
- Karyotype (N) and Fragile X Screen (N)
- AMH, as fertility an issue here- Low

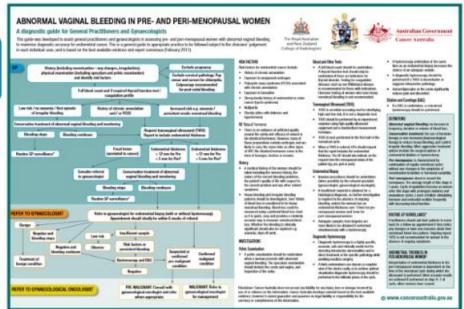




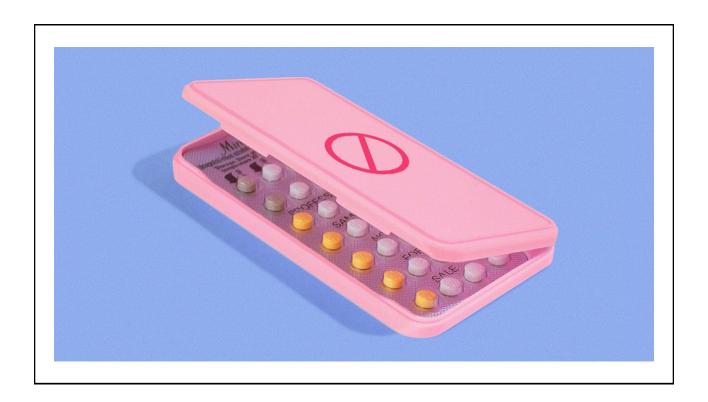
